➤ A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Dear Friends,

It is my pleasure to gratefully share the Global Ties Arizona 2022 Annual Report with all of you that helped to make our work possible.

After more than two years of pause in in-person programming due to the global pandemic and a shift to virtual exchange in 2020 and 2021, Global Ties Arizona was proud to "open our doors" back up as the U.S. Department of State commenced the return of in-person delegations through the International Visitor Leadership Program (IVLP) in March 2022. The IVLP has been the flagship program of Global Ties Arizona, even before our organization was officially founded. Throughout our history, we have led efforts to connect Arizona's leaders and citizens with the people of the world through this program "one handshake at a time." This said, it would be an understatement to say how thrilled we were to welcome international visitors back to our state and begin to facilitate these key international connections for Arizona once again.

As we put wheels in motion around planning for the return of visitors, we had two main priorities in addition to working to deliver high quality, impactful, and inclusive programming for both our international exchange participants and community members: safety and relationships.

Safety was and remains top of mind. We worked with the State Department, our national partner agencies, our local community partners, and health professionals to support and implement new protocols to mitigate the risk of illness during our visitors' time on the ground. We thank our friends at Arizona State University's BioDesign Institute for supporting our initial groups with over 100 in-kind COVID PCR tests, and all who cooperated with us to keep visitors and our community healthy.

In addition to safety, we prioritized restoring, growing, and fostering the relationships in our community that make so much of our work possible. You will see many of them highlighted here within this report. We could not conduct our work without the people and organizations that work so tirelessly to uplift our Arizona communities. It is because of all of you that Arizona is not only an incredible place to live, but an amazing place to bring visitors to. Coming off of a worldwide pandemic, thank you for opening your offices and homes, your hearts and minds, to our nearly 300 international visitors in 2022.

In 2023, we will continue to look to you to help us welcome the world to Arizona as citizen diplomats and ambassadors of our great state. We also look forward to providing you with continued and new opportunities to engage with people of other nations through special events and global learning engagements. This summer we will launch our Young Diplomats program, where Arizona youth can acquire the skills and mindset to aspire to and succeed in careers in diplomacy and international affairs. The Worldly Women Collective, another relatively new initiative, meets monthly and provides globally-minded women a space to collaborate and a platform to discuss key issues that affect women all around the world. There are a number of ways for you to get involved in our work, and we hope that you will.

Thank you for taking the time to read this report, and we are grateful for your support and your commitment to building meaningful global relationships for Arizona.

OUR FLAGSHIP PROGRAM INTERNATIONAL VISITOR LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

What is IVLP?

Global Ties Arizona (GTAZ) has connected Arizonans and the world's next leaders through the International Visitor Leadership Program (IVLP), the United States' foundational professional exchange program, dating back to the 1950s - even before our formal incorporation as a nonprofit.

Through the IVLP, visiting participants gain professional and cultural knowledge of our Arizona communities and provide our citizens the unique opportunity to have a hand in furthering U.S. foreign policy goals and strengthening America's global relationships through citizen diplomacy.

IVLP participants are selected by U.S. embassies abroad to embark on a 3-4 week national program that reflects their professional interests and expertise. Oftentimes, this is participants' first exposure to the United States.

At GTAZ, we thoughtfully design the visiting participants' itineraries to showcase the best Arizona has to offer across business, education, culture, tourism, and more. We intentionally match incoming visitors with their industry counterparts for impactful professional meetings. Visitors stay and play here, and their visits contribute to our local economy.

At the start of 2022, we implemented seven programs virtually under continued COVID restrictions. Fortunately, we proudly shifted back to in-person programs beginning in March - hosting 26 total on the ground.

The State Department brought 3,810 IVLP participants to the U.S. in 2022. Across our national network of 80+ community-based members.

GTAZ is proud to have hosted 13% of all international visitors that came to the U.S. in 2022 through IVLP.



Highlighted IVLP Program Themes

Democracy

Since its inception in 1940, the IVLP has been fundamental to the promotion of democracy around the world. In 2022, GTAZ hosted two projects supporting a special White House and IVLP initiative called the Summit for Democracy. The Summit for Democracy brought together municipal and national leaders from five continents to meet with American counterparts and address the three pillars of the summit: strengthening democracy and defending against authoritarianism, fighting corruption, and promoting respect for human rights. These two projects brought six Mayors from the countries of Argentina, Botswana, Italy, Republic of Kosovo, South Africa and The Gambia, as well as three female Parliament members from The Democratic Republic of the Congo. to our state. GTAZ facilitated engagements between the visiting officials and local municipal leaders across the Greater Phoenix region, including Mayors and City Councilmembers, community and civic organizations, and state officials, such as our former Secretary of State and newly elected Governor of Arizona, Katie Hobbs.

Press Freedom

The Edward R. Murrow Program for Journalists is a flagship initiative of the IVLP that supports media professionals from around the world and highlights the importance of press freedom. In 2022, GTAZ hosted six Edward R. Murrow programs focusing on topics such as new and traditional broadcast media, media responsibility, and combating disinformation. Through these six programs, 85 media professionals from 62 countries connected with peers and counterparts in media while in Arizona.

Chicanos Por La Causa (CPLC) welcomed two of these groups. Their meetings focused on strategies around communicating social causes, media relations efforts, and an overview of the programs and services CPLC provides to the Mexican-American and migrant communities. Representatives from CPLC's Action Fund discussed their advocacy work to ensure that Latino and other minority voices are justly represented in important community conversations and in positions of public office.

A group of Environmental Journalists from Thailand met with representatives of the Salt River Project (SRP) where they discussed water issues in Arizona. The Thai Journalists learned how SRP plans for and anticipates floods and drought and how they manage water storage, as well as their work with a branch of the National Weather Service, located directly in their building.

Human Rights

Democracy works to provide an environment that respects human rights and fundamental freedoms. Human rights are necessary to protect and preserve the humanity of all people and to ensure that every individual can live a life of dignity. Eight IVLP projects in 2022 focused on various aspects of human rights protections.

Five LGBTQI+ activists from Turkey met with ONE Community to engage in an interactive workshop that addressed coalition building and storytelling in October. The workshop informed best practices on how to share LGBTQI+ stories and create positive relationships with the media. ONE Community also welcomed a group of Human Rights activists from Latin America, sharing how to promote rights, equity, and inclusion for the LGBTQI+ community and for other underrepresented and disenfranchised communities.



In December, another group of Latin American activists participating in a program focused on Ending Gender-Based Violence met with various Phoenix-based nonprofits, government agencies, and academic institutions to discuss techniques to identify forms of gender-based abuse, report abuse, prosecute abusers, and provide assistance and protection to victims. Participants also gained an understanding around how economic opportunity, education, and civic participation can serve as tools for combating violence.

Economic Empowerment

Six of our 33 IVLP projects had a focus on economic development: zeroing in on topics such as entrepreneurship, bilateral economic cooperation, and foreign direct investment. Of special interest, 40 of the 49 participants were women, and two of the programs focused specifically on women in entrepreneurship.

In a November meeting with Arizona State University's Office of Economic Development and the Greater Phoenix Economic Council (GPEC), participants from seven countries across Europe learned about a program co-founded by both organizations: The Global Growth Accelerator (GGA). The GGA helps international firms accelerate their U.S. growth plans by providing a low-risk, expertguided, soft landing platform to do business in the United States.

In May, four women participants from Algeria, Greece, Rwanda, and Thailand, looking at Managing Foreign Direct Investment, met with representatives of the Maricopa Association of Governments (MAG) and other economic organizations to learn about Phoenix's financial market, industry growth, and MAG's research methods.

Health & Safety of Visitors & the Community

The return of international visitors has been cause for much excitement after more than two years of restrictions around travel and social gatherings during the COVID-19 pandemic. However, it remains the State Department's and GTAZ's top priority to ensure that both our visitors and our community members are kept safe and that we work to aid the mitigation of risk and illness as much as possible. To this end, upon the return to in-person programs, participants were equipped with appropriate PPE and received regular COVID testing throughout their national program.

GTAZ thanks Arizona State University's Biodesign Institute for partnering with us and administering over 100 in-kind COVID tests for our visitors through their Devil's Drop-off program. A multiregional Global Health Security program of 14 participants from 14 countries even got to tour the Biodesign Institute's facilities and COVID testing lab in May to see where and how tests are processed.

OUR OTHER PROGRAMS

Beyond IVLP: Other Exchanges

Thanks to our community relationships and our skillset in professional, educational, and cultural programming, GTAZ is equipped to implement a variety of international exchange programs.

In 2022, we also supported and hosted the below fee-for service exchanges:

French Youth Exchange

In June, GTAZ was proud to support a three-week immersive linguistic and cultural exchange program for French high school students, organized and led by Terres des Langues and FCT Strategies LLC. Nine students spent time with nine different families, all having a unique experience: from attending an American family summer camp to horseback riding adventures and volunteering in the community. GTAZ welcomed students and host families at the program orientation, hosting two cultural webinars for students during their program, and chaperoning a trip to Grand Canyon National Park.



GTAZ hosted a group of young journalists from the United Kingdom in June as part of a special initiative of the U.S. Embassy in London and in partnership with Meridian International Center. Titled "Diverse Perspectives", the initiative aimed to introduce early-career journalists from the UK to the United States, and particularly to debates surrounding the nation's diversity, government systems, and its ability to combat climate change and to emerge successfully from the COVID-19 pandemic. While in Phoenix, the journalists met, had briefings, and conducted interviews with City of Phoenix Councilwoman Yassamin Ansari, student climate activists from Arizona State University, Arizona Sustainability Alliance, and SPOT 127 Youth Media Center.

Global Learning Programs for the Community

As a World Affairs Council of America, GTAZ is dedicated to engaging our community in events that permit our citizens to better understand the world and its cultures, the role Arizona plays in international affairs, and the policy choices that impact our daily lives and our future.



Through community-focused conversations, we aim to expand informed, respectful public discourse about international relations and current world events and provide a platform for cross cultural learning.

Dining for Diplomacy: France

In February, GTAZ partnered with FCT Strategies LLC to host its second Dining for Diplomacy event with more than 50 guests at Vincent's on Camelback, a Phoenix landmark restaurant known for its "upscale French & Southwestern fusion menu & elegant vibe." The group received a visit from renowned Chef Vincent Guerithault, and featured speaker Flora Tromelin, Former Chief of Protocol to the U.S. Ambassador in France, led a program on diplomatic etiquette and French dining culture. Honorary Consul of France to Arizona, Nathan Fidel, also spoke to the guests.



Great Decisions



GTAZ partnered with the Phoenix Committee on Foreign Relations for a second year to offer the Foreign Policy Association's Great Decisions program, a professionally curated discussion series highlighting America's most critical foreign policy issues. A cohort gathered virtually every month for robust dialogue led by a topical expert. GTAZ and PCFR provided briefing booklets at no cost to participants, and access to accompanying online videos featuring insights from world leaders. PCFR Member Charles Blum moderated the discussions.



In November, GTAZ locally hosted the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations' annual CHINA Town Hall, a national conversation on U.S.-China relations, in partnership with Arizona State University's Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law.

More than 50 attendees viewed a conversation with the featured speaker, Former Ambassador Jon Huntsman Jr., and then took part in a local discussion with China experts Stephen MacKinnon (ASU Professor Emeritus), Doug Guthrie (Thunderbird School of Global Management), and Jeffrey Timmermans (ASU Walter Cronkite). The event was moderated by Richard Fincher, GTAZ Chair of the Board.



Worldly Women Collective

The Worldly Women Collective (WWC) grew to more than 100 women in 2022 - its second year. The group welcomed new women, and saw several collaborations and new partnerships sprout as a result. The WWC is an inclusive space where globally-minded women of the Greater Phoenix area convene monthly to make new connections, collaborate, and empower one another.



The group exists to share experiences across cultures, form collaborations in benefit of the betterment of our local community, engage in dialogue around women's and gender issues at home and around the world, and support one another in advancing professional or personal goals.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

J. Lester Shaffer Award for Outstanding Volunteerism

Since 1990, GTAZ has honored volunteers who have shown their commitment to international exchange by dedicating countless hours and supporting the organization with their expertise to aid the organization's mission of citizen diplomacy through the J. Lester Shaffer Award for Outstanding Volunteerism.

Governor's Proclamation: Arizona Citizen Diplomacy Month

In an official proclamation, Governor Ducey highlighted the distinct value citizen diplomacy and international exchange bring to Arizona and those who visit the state from abroad. He also emphasized the key role GTAZ plays in bringing international visitors to Arizona through the U.S. Department of State's International Visitor Leadership Program (IVLP).

To end a dynamic year, GTAZ was honored to host a visit from Anne Grimes, Director of the Office of International Visitors (OIV) at the U.S. Department of State in December. The OIV administers and oversees the International Visitor Leadership Program (IVLP).

During her time in Phoenix, Director Grimes met with various IVLP partners, including Mayor David Ortega of the City of Scottsdale; Mr. David Adame, CEO of Chicanos Por La Causa; and Ms. Angela Hughey, CEO of ONE Community. GTAZ board members hosted a special reception in Director Grimes' honor, which was also attended by a visiting delegation of human rights leaders from Latin America, as well as community leaders and IVLP supporters.




FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT
